From the Minister

The Protestant Reformation reminded us that Jesus has fulfilled "The Law" and therefore we no longer have to tithe our cumin, mint and dill and we can celebrate Christmas in July if we want to... But there may still be merit in observing the church calendar – not as our passport to heaven but as an aid to faithful living.

The seasons of Advent and Lent can help us prepare for Christmas and Easter, when we celebrate the birth and death and resurrection of Jesus. Many use these periods to improve their well-being, by giving up what is harmful and taking up healthier practices. There is much to be said for doing this but Christians will want a more devotional focus as well, something that will energise our belief in God, bring us closer to Jesus and make us more mindful of creation.

This year I have been using a booklet called 'Alive' by Tearfund. It poses the questions: "Am I living the abundant life that Jesus offers? And, just as importantly, am I helping others to do the same?" Taking us back to the beginning of Genesis, Tearfund's theological adviser, Gideon Heugh, reminds us of the various ways God has fashioned us for blessing and to be a blessing.

On the other hand, those preferring a more social approach have found the Alpha Course helpful. You will find information on how this works and how to get involved later in the year (the course in April is now postponed).

While the roads and restaurants empty, the airways are choking with opinions and advice in relation to the coronavirus crisis. Once we have acted swiftly to protect the vulnerable, safeguard the livelihoods of our workforce and enable the education of our children and students, we need God's guidance for how to respond faithfully to our strange new circumstances. The temptation will be to rush into all sorts of worthy initiatives, to look after each other. Already social media are on the look-out for heroic examples to propel/shame us into action. But let's remember that what matters is that we meet people's genuine needs and to discern these we need to start by listening. At a deeper level, we should probably also be asking what permanent changes this crisis might be calling for? After all, it hasn't happened in a vacuum but in the midst of climate-change, civil wars and international conflict, growing income disparities, slavery, celebrity culture... the list goes on. As Christians, our horizon lies beyond - in the new creation. But rather than ignoring our present challenges, this gives us a bright, rather than a gloomy, reason to engage. If the future is governed by your worst nightmare, then the best you can hope to achieve is damage limitation; but if you are looking forward to heaven coming to earth, then every constructive act is charged with eternal significance...With love and blessings, Rory




Spring 2020

CORONAVIRUS- FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What about getting into the church building? Church buildings may be open at specific times for prayer, but we ask all people who attend to follow strict self-distancing procedures by remaining at least 2 metres away from others.

The church will then remain closed for at least 72 hours to prevent any spread of virus from surfaces.

What about my weekly offering?

If you give through standing order, we ask that you **continue to do so**.

All plate donations will need to stop, so if you currently donate by weekly envelope or cash in the open plate we now encourage each and every one of you to consider following the lead of Margaret Macrae, our Church Treasurer, who has set up a Standing Order.

Our general finances operate pretty close to the wire and our outgoings will continue as before so it is imperative that church giving continues if at all possible. WE ALSO UNDERSTAND at this time that a lot of people may be affected by the downturn in the tourist industry, so we ask that you **give what you can**. 

ELDERS RETREAT 2020

The Elders spent the weekend at the end of February on retreat in Inverness, where devotion and thoughts over the two days were led by Martin Haworth, former Scottish coordinator of Latin link, who now runs Roaming Scotland, a tour group that focuses on the life of St Columba, around various Celtic locations in Scotland. Our sessions included times of worship, bible reading and prayer, and helped us to reflect on our journey as Elders. The weekend meditations also provided time and space to study His word and hear from God.

We also spent an afternoon on a walk to the Pictish Fort in Inverness, linking the Local History of St Columba and the Pictish King with the stunning beauty and solitude of the places they inhabited.



CHURCH OF SANCTUARY SEMINAR

On Friday 13 March, Church of Sanctuary met for a roundtable seminar in Edinburgh. Church of Sanctuary is characterised by three features: willingness to learn from refugees, commitment of the whole congregation, enthusiasm for telling others. The movement is being pioneered by Inderjit Bhogal, himself a refugee from India, whose journey brought him to the UK via Kenya and Tanzania and from Sikhism to Christianity. He challenged us to prioritise our common humanity, to practice hospitality and to challenge hatred and hostility. In small groups we shared our experience of serving refugees and explored the opportunities and obstacles facing us in developing that service.



The day after (Saturday 14 March) Jayme Reeves, who calls herself a “public theologian”, presented three dimensions of refugee service: Table Fellowship – meeting the practical and social needs of refugees; Intellectual Welcome – respecting the attitudes and beliefs which refugees cherish; Protective Hospitality – providing a safe place for refugees to recover and begin life anew. These principles are common to the three so-called Abrahamic faiths of Judaism, Christianity and Islam. Their context is the hostile environment in which

these faiths were nurtured, their shared experience of persecution and resistance and the prophetic responsibility which arises out of such a heritage – to use our freedom to speak out on behalf of those who are still oppressed. Next up was Sabir Zazai, Head of the Scottish Refugee Council, also a refugee (from Afghanistan). His story illustrates how much refugees have to offer those countries which provide sanctuary. Karina Martin then introduced the network of Welcome Churches, which offers training and support for churches who wish to identify as ‘Refugee Friendly’, in a similar way to those which identify as ‘Eco-Friendly’.



In between came an audience with Andy Bevan, who runs the Scottish office of International Justice Mission. IJM recently celebrated its 20th anniversary and the liberation of over 50,000 slaves, many of them children. The organisation is guided by Scripture and fuelled by prayer. Its operational model involves local offices identifying situations in which people are enslaved, mobilising the authorities (police and local government) to rescue victims and arrest perpetrators, then providing after-care for as long as necessary. The

connections between IJM and Church of Sanctuary/ Welcome Churches are obvious at the theoretical level but have yet to be worked through in practice.

Through our twinning with St Paul's Amman and our involvement with New Scots Holidays, Strath & Sleat is in the forefront of refugee and justice ministry. And so we should be! Jesus himself began life as a refugee in Egypt. Both Old and New Testaments prioritise care for the outcast. And believers are encouraged that those who welcomed strangers have found that they were entertaining angels. Most importantly, Jesus teaches that it is in meeting the needs of the most vulnerable that we serve him. So, where to from here for our church? On the one hand, we can develop our involvement in New Scots Holidays and in our twinning with St Paul's. There are many ways to do that, from helping with transport, the organisation of activities, providing hospitality, to visiting Jordan even. On the other hand, we need to make our church communities places of hope for current residents of Strath & Sleat. Neither will be easy. Both will involve sacrifice and risk. Most crucially it challenges us to change our thinking: from what do I want out of church to how can I contribute to making our churches places of hope and sanctuaries of welcome?

From Open Doors' Worldwatch List 2020

PROFESSOR JOHN BROWN

Late last year we said goodbye to a good friend and familiar figure – in the person of John Brown. John and Margaret have a house in Breakish, where they have enjoyed relaxing with their grown-up children, Stuart and Lorna, over many years. We offer them our condolences.

Though John delighted in his island home, he did not shut himself away here. Indeed, on the day he died, he had been enjoying an aerial view of the Cuillin in a light aircraft and delivered a lecture about the wonders of the cosmos in Tarskavaig.

Among his audience was one of our younger church members, who remarked afterwards: “My mind is completely blown!” John’s chauffeur on that occasion was Kerry, whom he had tutored to a First Class degree in Astrophysics and who was teaching him to play the saxophone in return.

John’s talks might have been mind-blowing but they were never dull. This is because they were invariably laced with another passion of his: magic tricks. These were a fitting expression of the playful side of this serious scientist, among whose many accomplishments were the Professorship he held at Glasgow University, the OBE he was awarded for his contribution to Astrophysics and the honorary title by which he was known to many: Astronomer Royal for Scotland.

Rory was invited to conduct the funeral, which well reflected this remarkable man’s breadth of interests and the affection in which he was held by so many. Culdross Crematorium was filled to capacity and there were not one but four tributes from colleagues, friends and family. Roddie Rankin, minister of Kyle & Plockton Free Church, with whom John had enjoyed exploring issues of faith, led the prayers, while Margaret’s Glasgow minister delivered a well-balanced homily. Most memorable was the praise, led by Lorna and Stuart’s jazz band.

Those who enjoyed John’s company might appreciate the book he recently published, featuring the poetry of his friend, Rab Wilson, and entitled ‘Oor Big Braw Cosmos.’ The minister has a copy if anyone would like to borrow it...



KILMORE WINDOWS APPEAL

The hard work to raise the funding to replace the windows in Kilmore Church is paying off and we have now raised enough money to allow us to accept the tender we received from Compass Building and Construction Services of £87,227 plus VAT to replace all the windows with a special kind of double glazing that meets the specifications required by planning regulations for a listed building. On top of that there will be professional fees.

Funding applications so far have raised £73,000 and we will be able to claim back the VAT element from the Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme once the work is completed. Our online appeal and fundraising has raised approximately £11000 and gift aid will be due on some of that. We have had great support from the local community, including a £1000 donation from the Clan Donald Lands Trust and our charity café and silent auction held on 22nd February was extremely well attended by members of the local community and raised £2900, including donations made on the day.

Efforts need to continue though and there will be a further grant application submitted soon and more fundraising. We would appreciate your support if you are able to help in any way; here is the link to our online fundraising page.
